This Month Lent begins. Lent is a season. Lent is a time for self-examination, confession, spiritual exercise, discipleship training, and refreshing our perspective on what it means to follow Christ today. It is a spiritually challenging time, and it will conclude on Easter as we celebrate Jesus' victory.

Lent is an opportunity. An opportunity to practice "resetting" ourselves. A season to begin reorienting or retuning our lives to the ways of Christ. It's a period we can begin a process; not a moment to magically become someone we're not. Transformation is a process. As we move through this season let's invite ourselves and encourage one another to be intentional in our discipleship. What might that look like? Well, how about slowing down and listening more for Jesus' voice in our day. How about not so much "giving up" something but rather taking on a "Lenten practice" like weekly visiting a shut-in person, helping once a week during the six weeks of Lent at Second Harvest, or a soup kitchen, or choosing now "date afternoons" with each of your kids during Lent, or carving out a time through the season for a daily walk.

A compass can begin to lose it's sense of True North as it's used, and an instrument - as it's played - will begin to go out of tune. Our lives are the same. In our day-to-day routines and rhythms we can lose our orientation and we can go "out of tune". Lent is a time to be reoriented by the grace of God. During this lent allow the Holy Spirit to retune you to the key of God's unlimited and unconditional love.

One of the traditional Hymns often sung in this season is "Take Time To Be Holy". Holy literally means "other than" or "set apart". We are called by God to be "other than" the ways and values of the world. We have been, through the mercy and call of Christ, "set apart" for the work of the Kingdom of God; the Commonwealth of Christ!

These days are full of division, cruelty, violence, war, and much that is not of God. How do we continue to point toward the way of Shalom? How do we continue to stay in tune of the key of God's Love? How can the words of Jesus, Mahatma Gandi, Martin Luther King, Mother Teresa, Arch Bishop Oscar Romero even begin to address the angers and dangers of our lives today? What is the alternative to despair?

The Jews have a word for it: Tikum Olam. It means "to repair the world." It's the activity of God's love in the world. We are invited to participate in this very work as followers of Jesus! This happens in big ways and in small ones. Sometime the repair is obvious, noticeable. Sometimes it is quiet, hidden. But it does not happen unless we give ourselves to the work of making the world more gentle and just. It does not happen unless you and I do something.

The good news of the work of the Holy Spirit is you and I do not work alone. We are woven into the cloth that is the church: the body of Christ. Sidney Haris said that the question, "What can one person do?" must be faced by each of us, and that sometimes it seems one person can do little – but one and one and one and one can do a great deal!" He's right. One and one and one and one can do a great deal! Attuned together in God's love, the "orchestra" of disciples can "turn the world upside-down". With our needles all pointed to the true north of justice for each and all, we can heal and repair the world through the balm of shalom!

John Wesley believed strongly that Christians are to be about the work of Christ in the world. He wrote: "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can." This Lent, let us live in the "other way" of grace. This Lent, let us be set apart for the work of love and justice. Allow the Holy spirit to reorient your life and re-tune your spirit.

Looking ahead, On Palm Sunday (March 24th) we'll be serving cinnamon rolls after church. Also, the group has decided to begin a new, yearly experience to the youth calendar: in the Spring, Juniors & Seniors will travel to the cities for a evening of fine dining and take in a theater show. We'll finalize this Springs date at our Feb 7th meeting.

#### Confirmation Orientation:

Recently, some individuals have asked about a new Confirmation Orientation series. We will begin Confirmation this lent. This class will meet twice a month through Eastertide, have two sessions during the Summer and then meet twice monthly from Sept 2024 through May 2025. It is open to those who are high school freshman on up. Youth will have mentors and adults will have sponsors. Parents of youth and spouses of adults will often be a part of the class meeting also (about once a month). The class meets on Sunday afternoons from 4:00 to 5:00. Dates for this Spring are: Feb 18th, March 3rd & 17th, April 14th & 28th, May 5th & 19th.

#### The Season of Lent:

Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. The English word "Lent" comes from the Anglo–Saxon word "Lencten", which means "lengthen" and refers to the lengthening days of "spring." The season is a preparation for celebrating Easter.



Historically, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by converts and then became a time for penance by all Christians. The First Sunday describes Jesus' temptation by Satan; and the Sixth Sunday (Passion/Palm Sunday), Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem and his subsequent passion and death. Note that the readings during Lent, until Passion/Palm Sunday, focus primarily on the meaning of baptism and discipleship, in continuity with the season's original purpose. Because Sundays are always little Easters, the penitential spirit of Lent should be tempered with joyful expectation of the Resurrection.

Holy Week is the final week of Lent, beginning with Passion/Palm Sunday and concluding with Holy Saturday. It is during these days that the readings focus primarily on the last days and suffering and death of Jesus.

The Great Three Days—sometimes called the Triduum or Pasch—from sunset Holy Thursday through sunset Easter Day are the climax of Lent (and of the whole Christian year) and a bridge into the Easter Season. These days proclaim the paschal mystery of Jesus Christ's passion, death, and resurrection. During these days, the community journeys with Jesus from the upper room, to the cross, to the tomb, and to the garden. They should be seen as a great unified service beginning with a service of Holy Communion on Holy Thursday and concluding with the services of Easter Day. These services may be connected with a prayer vigil lasting from Holy Thursday evening (or Good Friday) until the first service of Easter and may be accompanied by fasting. We ended 2023 having approximately \$13,000 of expenses over income. We plan to re-evaluate the 2024 budget at our July meeting and will keep you advised. #### UMCGR Endowment Fund (CONGREGATIONAL TRUST FUND) NEWS

Monthly average - 2023

As the calendar turns to February, we have just celebrated the life of this congregation in 2023 and launched plans for 2024 at the Church Conference on January 21, 2024. At this Conference, there were two notable changes:

- The name was changed to UMCGR Endowment Fund. That means that when you donate to the Fund in honor
  of someone or memory of a loved one, make the check out to UMCGR and put Endowment Fund in the memo
  line. (However, being frugal, the Committee will continue using the already printed letterhead and offering envelopes for 2024)
- A motion was passed to distribute \$20,000 for use in 2024 according to our policy:

\$2,000 for ministry beyond Grand Rapids area

\$9,000 for emerging ministry in the community

\$9,000 for emerging capital improvements

It was also celebrated that as of January 1,2024 the market value has increased to \$619,306 which generates the money available for distribution. During the 28 years of the Fund's existence, \$493,708 has been distributed for emerging ministries. It allows our Trustees and other committees to be nimble in responding to unexpected needs without having to launch a special offering for each one.

The Finance Committee reported that our anticipated operational expense budget exceeds the estimate of giving trend by \$54,000 for the coming year. By policy, that difference cannot be funded by the Endowment Fund. The Endowment Fund will continue to be a "second mile" giving, legacy gift. We encourage you to make sure your commitment to the General Fund comes first.

May God bless and guide us as we go about doing the ministry we are called to do.


#### Lumberjack Sunday is February 25th.
